On this day, we were notified that our school was recognized as a 2011 Blue Ribbon School by the United States Department of Education. To be eligible for consideration in 2011, ALL grades tested were required to be the top 15 percent of schools in both reading (English language arts) and mathematics. In previous years, only the highest grade tested was required to meet this standard.

"National Blue Ribbon Schools are committed to accelerating student achievement and preparing students for success in college and careers. Their success is an example for others to follow."


